Networking and collaboration within the region, and with the rest of the world, enhances the knowledge of the dynamic and ever-changing pace of science and technology necessary for achieving the common goal of science democratization. The network also aims to help establish new science centers and museums, as well as science communication initiatives and projects, in all countries of the region.

The North Africa and Middle East Science centers network (NAMES) was created in 2006, to bring together entities involved in science communication, especially science centers and museums, within the MENA region. The aim of the network is to foster professional development in the field and strengthen the position of informal science education within the community, through the promotion of best practices and effective communication.

NAMES was initiated during a meeting organized by the Bibliotheca Alexandrina (BA) Planetarium Science Center (PSC) on 30 January 2006. On 9–10 November 2006, Tunis Science City hosted NAMES launching meeting, where the five Founding Members signed the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU).

NAMES was led during its first two terms, 2006–2010, by Ms. Hoda Elmikaty, BA Deputy Director. During Ms. Elmikaty's Presidency, NAMES Secretariat Office (SO) was established at the BA, where it has been hosted since. In addition to housing, the BA offers NAMES SO legal and technical support. The BA also hosted NAMES first Biennial Conference, NAMES 2008, which marked a milestone of international recognition, participation, and cooperation.

In its second two terms, 2010–2014, NAMES was led by late Mr. Mijbil Almutawa, Vice-Chairman and CEO of The Scientific Center of Kuwait (TSCK). During Mr. Almutawa's Presidency, NAMES co-hosted the 6th Science Centers World Congress, hosted by the sister network SAASTEC in Cape Town, South Africa,



in 2011. In 2012, NAMES also embarked on its first major international collaboration, launching the Euro-Mediterranean and Middle East (EMME) Summer School of Science Communication, in partnership with the sister network Ecsite.

Since 2014, NAMES has witnessed a stable increase in memberships despite political and economic challenges within the region. In 2014, Ms. Sawsan Dalaq, Director of the Children's Museum Jordan, was elected third President of NAMES. Under Ms. Dalaq's direction, NAMES Executive Team focuses on consolidating what has been achieved thus far, reinforcing NAMES reach, and expanding collaboration among its members, as well as with international partners. The Team is also currently focusing on enhancing member benefits and services, as well as the inception and development of new initiatives, collaborations, and projects among members.

On the occasion of its 10th Anniversary, this year, NAMES is introducing an updated corporate identity, a revamped website, and a newly launched quarterly e-newsletter entitled ALMANARA.

SUMMER SCHOOL FOR SCIENCE COMMUNICATION

• Initiated by *Città della Scienza* (Naples, Italy), EMME Summer School has been established to reinforce a stronger partnership between the countries of the Euro-Mediterranean and Middle East and to support democratic transformation and institution-building, with the aim of delivering sustainable and inclusive growth and job creation.

• The Initial Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed during the Ecsite Annual Conference 2012 in Toulouse, France; it was signed by Ecsite and NAMES Networks as Promoting Partners, with the following eight institutions as Active Partners:

• The EMME Summer School takes place every other year in September for a duration of one week (five days); it represents both a place of debate where professionals meet to discuss common challenges, as well as a "starting event" for planning programs at the beginning of the new scholar/academic year.

• The EMME Summer School is addressed to middle profile staff of existing science centers/museums and to newcomers from other organizations—universities, local authorities, associations, etc.—who want to establish new activities in the field of science communication or to develop new science centers.

• The 1st edition, EMME 2013, was supposed to be hosted by *Città della Scienza*, Naples, Italy; however, due to a massive fire that destroyed the Center, the 1st EMME edition was hosted by *Parque de las Ciencias*, Granada, Spain, 22–27 September 2013.

- 25 Participants attended EMME 2013 from Algeria (2), Egypt (3), Italy (1), Kuwait (4), Palestine (2), Portugal (1), Spain (1), Tunisia (1), Turkey (6), United Arab Emirates (2), and United Kingdom (1).

• Following the successful results of the 1st edition, the 2nd edition, EMME 2015, was hosted by the Bibliotheca Alexandrina Planetarium Science Center, Alexandria, Egypt, 5–10 September 2015.

- 15 Participants attended EMME 2015 from Bahrain (1), Egypt (3), Jordan (3), Kuwait (3), Palestine (2), Saudi Arabia (1), Tunisia (1), and United Arab Emirates (1).



• In light of the success of the first two editions, a new four-year Partnership Agreement was signed during the Ecsite Annual Conference 2016 in Graz, Austria, with nine institutions as Active Partners:

International Day (ID) of Science Centers 2016

• Established by UNESCO in 2001, the World Science Day for Peace and Development is celebrated annually worldwide on 10 November. It offers an opportunity to demonstrate to the wider public why science is relevant to their daily lives and to engage them in debates on related issues.

• The 2016 World Science Day for Peace and Development will be dedicated to the International Day of Science Centers. It will be a global initiative, supported by UNESCO, to raise awareness of the role



that Science Centers and Museums play in increasing scientific awareness, engagement and participation among people in promoting sustainable development, and in providing solutions to global challenges such as climate change, biodiversity innovation, renewable energies, water shortages and human health (HIV/ AIDS).

• ID16 Principal Outcomes are to:

Illustrate the role that science centers can play to educate the public about Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) through the organization of ad-hoc events involving new partners on local, regional, and international level;



Develop new concepts on communicating SDGs to diverse audiences;

Prepare a document for use by the science center field and UNESCO in order to inform and train science communicators and professionals of science popularization about the best practices and recommended programs and strategies to communicate to and engage the public with SDGs.

It was with a heavy heart that NAMES Executive Team received and disseminated the devastating news of the passing away of Mr. Mijbil Almutawa, Vice-Chairman and CEO of The Scientific Center of Kuwait (TSCK), on 27 July 2016. Mr. Almutawa was an unequivocal source of inspiration and a tremendous support to both his TSCK Team even before the Center opened to the public in 2000, as well as to NAMES Executive Team throughout its ten years of existence. His presence in NAMES Executive Team will be forever profoundly missed; yet, his legacy will persevere.

Mr. Almutawa was one of the five founding members of NAMES whose conviction and commitment was the force behind establishing and launching NAMES in 2006.
